## **Nursing, BSN**

This program prepares students to deliver superior nursing care and provide leadership in nursing in the increasingly complex and challenging field of modern health care. The program emphasizes health promotion and disease prevention, capitalizing on early detection of potential health problems, health maintenance in ambulatory services, and preparation for the managerial responsibilities of nursing.

## Why Mason's BSN Program?

State of the art facilities: Upgraded labs and classrooms in Peterson Family Health Sciences Hall

#### **Prime Location**

- Clinical Placements: include hospitals, community health, and school setting in Washington, D.C. and Northern Virginia (Arlington, Fairfax, Loudoun, and Prince William Counties)
- Employment: More than 8,000 graduates nationwide as staff nurses in clinics, hospitals, schools, community health, health department, home health, and hospice settings

### **Exceptional Student Experience**

- Virginia's largest public research university
- 1:8 faculty-to-student ratio in clinical settings
- High retention and low attrition rates
- BSN program offered for more than 50 years
- One of the largest BSN programs in Virginia

## **Faculty Strengths**


### **Emphasis on Faculty Practice and Research**

- Workforce Development: \$2.6 million grant in CDC and AmeriCorps partnership to help rebuild the nation's public health sector (*R. Sutter*)
- Forensic Nursing: \$1 million grant from the U.S. Department of Justice pairing forensic bruise analysis with machine learning (Scafide)
- School Health: \$150,000 partnership-building grant to create collaborative research activities that advance health equity in Virginia K-12 schools (Maughan)
- **Underserved Populations**: Mason and Partners (MAP) Clinics-students and faculty provide health care and social services (*R. Sutter*)
- **Mental Health**: The behavior health clinic in the Population Health Center is the only teaching clinic in the country for psychiatric medication management service that is affordable for all (*Eklou*)



### **VR & Simulation Lab**

- More than 1,500 square feet of dedicated simulation/VR lab space
- VR extends beyond the lab and is portable to other classrooms and meeting spaces. Any space can be a VR lab
- Three state-of-the-art control rooms, each manages two simulation lab rooms



## Interdisciplinary Learning Opportunities

- Standards-based simulation curriculum is integrated into course objectives to ensure a holistic learning experience
- The VR/Sim Lab will extend learning opportunities in areas such as OB/GYN, pediatrics, and gerontology
- High-fidelity VR simulators and augmented reality simulators

## **Traditional BSN (Direct Entry)**

### Important things to know:

- Competitive admissions process
- Admission is offered only once a year for the fall semester
- Limited enrollment is due to the available clinical spaces
- Meeting the eligibility guidelines does not guarantee admission
- Have an alternative or parallel path to achieve your goal

Direct Entry is for incoming freshmen ONLY and it is a four-year, full-time program.

## **BSN Program Information**

### **Clinical Information**

- Sites are located in Northern Virginia and D.C.
- Currently no Maryland sites
- Approximately 600 clinical hours completed in:
  - Medical Surgical
  - Long-Term Care
  - Obstetrics
  - Pediatrics
  - Community Health
  - Critical Care
  - Psychiatric Care
- School of Nursing schedules your clinical assignments

## **Direct Entry Application Process**

- Applicants must apply by the Non-Binding Early Action Deadline of November 1 as a degreeseeking, freshman student at George Mason University (can also apply through the CommonApp)
  - > If students apply Regular Decision, they will only be considered on a space-available basis
  - > After fall 2025, applicants will not be considered for nursing if they apply Regular Decision
- If you're currently participating in dual-enrollment classes, you are still considered a freshman applicant
- Specify Nursing as your intended major
- Additional application requirements will be included for you to complete to be considered for the Nursing Program

## **Direct Entry Application Process**

#### **Additional Application Requirements**

 Students are required to respond to short answer prompts regarding: your interest in nursing, leadership experiences, overcoming obstacles, and diversity and inclusion

#### **Evaluation Criteria for Admission**

- 3.0 High School Cumulative GPA
- Science and Math Courses
- Nurse Preparation Courses or Programs
  - Knowledge and understanding of the nursing/medical field
- Leadership experiences and other experiential learning opportunities
- Responses to short answer prompts

The School of Nursing will only be looking at these requirements for admission into the program.



Admission decisions for the nursing program will be sent separately from your university admission decision.

Admission to the university does not mean you are automatically admitted into the nursing program.

## **BSN Program Information**

### If not admitted, here are some common reasons for denial:

- Sheer volume: given the volume of applications received for the limited number of clinical spaces, other applicants presented stronger applications
- Performance in Science and Math courses
- High School GPA
- Lack of evidence in leadership and experiential learning opportunities
- Lack of thoughtful responses to the short answer prompts
- Lack of understanding of the nursing field

If not admitted, you will have another opportunity to apply to the nursing program after your first year at Mason.

## **Academic Progression Policy & Grading Standards**

#### Cumulative GPA of 2.5 each semester to progress

• If lower than 2.5, you will have one semester to bring GPA back to 2.5 or will be ineligible to continue in the program

### Must have at least a C in all nursing prerequisite courses and Mason Core

• No more than one (1) nursing prerequisite course can be repeated due to unsuccessful completion

### Must have at least a C+ or higher in Nursing classes/S for Satisfactory

- If you receive lower than a C+ in a class, you have one chance to retake the course and will not be
  able to take Nursing classes the following semester
- If you receive lower than a C+ in more than one class, you are ineligible to progress in the program

NURS classes must be taken in their respective semesters; cannot take courses earlier

## **Accelerated Masters Programs**

### Earn a Masters Degree quicker with an Accelerated Masters Program

These programs allow you to streamline the application process with no GRE requirement. It gives you the ability to take 6 credits of graduate courses as an undergrad that will double count towards the bachelor's degree and the master's degree.

Health Administration, BS/Health Systems Management MHA Bachelor's Degree (any)/Health Informatics, MS Bachelor's Degree (any)/Nutrition, MS Bachelor's Degree (any)/Public Health, MPH

### **Advanced Standing MSW Program**

- Eligible for students who complete Mason's BSW program
- Allows students to skip MSW generalization year and move directly into specialization year

## **College of Public Health Learning Community**

- For students admitted into the nursing program OR enrolled in another CPH major
- Opportunity to live and study together
- UNIV 150: 1-credit course complete during the first semester of your freshman year
- If interested, apply when you complete your housing application through the Housing and Residence Life Office

## **Student Advising in CPH**

Freshmen and Transfer students will meet advisors during orientation to be advised for their first semester of enrollment. Once enrolled, all students should initiate a meeting with their advisor at least once a semester.


