This study is designed to shed light on the impact of broad-based, video telehealth that is accessible from the home rather than from provider offices. The telehealth program being studied is offered by a national insurer to 19 million insured members. This study will provide insights into whether home-based, video telemedicine improves access to care, improves quality of care, and reduces costs for common conditions and in doing so will inform Medicare, Medicaid, and state telemedicine policies.

Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. Differential Effects of Prevention Efforts, Behavioral Interventions, and Alternative Sanctions on Juvenile Justice Youth Outcomes. 10/1/14-9/30/16

A key issue facing policymakers is how to structure policies and interventions which can generate lasting gains in education, human capital, and other determinants of social well-

being for children. Approaches that intervene with adolescents in the juvenile justice system to reduce criminal outcomes generally have not been studied over the long term, leaving the possibility that intensive intervention specifically for individuals at greatest risk for later violent and delinquent behavior may be highly efficient. The proposed research will examine the impact of alternative approaches including various behavioral health interventions, and probation or community restitution versus incarceration, for various subsets of youth who are already at risk and involved in the juvenile justice system, on their re-offending and educational outcomes.
